HUMANITIES (HUM)

HUM-1010 Introduction to Humanities 3 Credits

Examines creative enterprise in human cultures through the study of great works of art and literature. Lectures, performances, exhibits, and multi-media presentations.

Lecture: 3 hours
Prerequisite(s): None.

HUM-1020 The Individual in Society 3 Credits

Introduction to works of art, philosophies, and scientific views that portray, explain, and evaluate positions and interactions of individuals in society. Lectures, performances, exhibits, and multi-media presentations. *Lecture: 3 hours*

Prerequisite(s): ENG-0995 Applied College Literacies, or appropriate score on English Placement Test; or departmental approval. Note: ENG-0990 Language Fundamentals II taken prior to Fall 2021 will also meet prerequisite requirements.

HUM-102H Honors Individual in Society 3 Credits

Introduction to works of art, philosophies, literature, and political views that portray, explain, and evaluate positions and interactions of individuals in society. Emphasis on an in-depth study of primary sources and their reflection in our modern culture.

Lecture: 3 hours

Prerequisite(s): ENG-1010 College Composition I, or ENG-101H Honors College Composition I; or departmental approval.

HUM-1100 Leadership Development Studies 3 Credits

Introduction to theories and ethics of group dynamics in leadership styles through study of classic and contemporary writings. Internationally recognized course, designed by Phi Theta Kappa. Lectures, discussions, and experiential learning exercises.

Lecture: 3 hours

Prerequisite(s): ENG-0995 Applied College Literacies, or appropriate score on English Placement Test. Note: ENG-0990 Language Fundamentals II taken prior to Fall 2021 will also meet prerequisite requirements.

HUM-175H Honors Forum: Critical Issues 3 Credits

Analysis of contemporary critical issues through their roots in past and present social, philosophical, and political attitudes and literature. Topics may vary with each offering, lecture, discussion, guest presentation, and multi-media presentation.

Lecture: 3 hours

Prerequisite(s): Appropriate score on English Placement Test to enroll in ENG-101H Honors College Composition I, or departmental approval.

HUM-179H Honors Contract in Humanities 1 Credit

Honors Contract complements and exceeds requirements and expected outcomes and objectives for an existing HUM-1000-level honors course through formulation of a contract with a faculty mentor. This independent study at the honors level may also be taken with a non-honors course. When taken with a non-honors course the Honors Contract adds an honor experience to that course. In conjunction with a faculty mentor, student will formulate a contract, which upon completion will result in distinctive scholarship. The student is required to meet on a regularly scheduled basis with the instructor for mentor-student tutorial sessions. A maximum of six Honor Contracts (six credit hours) may be taken at the college (includes 179H and 279H).

Lecture: 1 hours

Prerequisite(s): Must be taken concurrently with a HUM-1000-level course whose instructor agrees to mentor the student in this contract. Departmental approval required.

HUM-1812 Special Topics: Humanities and Leadership 3 Credits

This course examines different perspectives of leadership through literature, philosophy, and history inviting students to assess their own leadership potential and determine via positive examples of leadership new insights into their own and other's cultural leadership traditions. In collaboration with a community partner, students will explore key issues in leadership development.

Lecture: 3 hours
Prerequisite(s): None.

HUM-1813 Special Topics in Renaissance Italy and Beyond 3 Credits

Students will become learn about the history of art in Northern Italy during the period of the Renaissance is areas including literature, sculpture, art, architecture, and politics. Florence is the birth of the Humanities as a concept, and as such, the class will delve into how the Humanities became a guiding principal behind the one of the greatest artistic movements in history.

Prerequisite(s): HUM-1020 The Individual in Society or HUM-102H Honors Individual in Society.

HUM-1814 Special Topics in Eco-humanities in Iceland: Culture, Environment, and Sustainability 3 Credits

Course Description: This immersive course delves into the intersection of the humanities and the natural environment through the lens of Iceland's unique history, literature, mythos, and landscape. Students will explore how Iceland's history, literature, and arts reflect and shape ecological consciousness and sustainability practices. The course will cover topics such as the impact of volcanic activity on Icelandic folklore, the role of sagas in environmental narratives, and contemporary efforts in renewable energy and conservation. Through this international travel opportunity alongside course readings and discussions, students will gain a comprehensive understanding of the Eco-humanities and their significance in fostering a sustainable

HUM-1820 Independent Study/Research in Humanities 1-3 Credits

Directed individual study. Study/research title and specific content arranged between instructor and student. May be repeated for a maximum of six credits of different topics.

Lecture: 1-3 hours

Prerequisite(s): Departmental approval, and instructor approval, and ENG-0995 Applied College Literacies, or appropriate score on English Placement Test. Note: ENG-0990 Language Fundamentals II taken prior to Fall 2021 will also meet prerequisite requirements.

HUM-182H Honors Independent Study/Research in Humanities 1-3 Credits

Honors-level directed individual study. Must meet criteria set forth in the Honors Course Checklist used to approve regular honors courses. Study/research title and specific content arranged between instructor and student. May be repeated for a maximum of six credits of different topics.

Lecture: 1-3 hours

Prerequisite(s): Departmental approval and instructor approval, and ENG-0995 Applied College Literacies, or appropriate score on English Placement Test; and must have earned an A or B in at least 3 honors courses. Note: ENG-0990 Language Fundamentals II taken prior to Fall 2021 will also meet prerequisite requirements.

HUM-2020 Community Engagement Through the Humanities 3 Credits

A project-based course designed to help students develop skills as active participants in a pluralistic democratic society through direct service, education, and reflection opportunities. The course will emphasize collaboration, methods of inquiry characteristic of the humanities, evidence-based decision making, humanities-based research techniques, social responsibility, and effective communication. Students will use an interdisciplinary collaborative approach to analyze and actively participate in principles and practices of community engagement through a local lens.

HUM-2030 Culture and Belief 3 Credits

An introduction to works of art, philosophies, religions, and scientific views that portray, explain, and evaluate the shared human search for meaning in the world as contextualized within culture. The class consists of lectures concerning works of art which provide a survey of world views that have been adopted by various cultures through history.

Lecture: 3 hours

Prerequisite(s): ENG-1010 College Composition I or ENG-101H Honors College

Composition I; or departmental approval. OAN Approved: Ohio Transfer 36 TMAH.

HUM-279H Sophomore Honors Contract in Humanities 1 Credit

Sophomore Honors Contract in Humanities complements and exceeds requirements and expected outcomes for an existing Humanities 2000-level course through formulation of a contract with a faculty mentor. In conjunction with a faculty mentor, student will formulate a contract that upon completion will result in distinctive scholarship appropriate to honors 2000-level. In order to complete the contract, student is required to meet on a regularly scheduled basis with instructor offering the contract for mentor-student tutorial sessions. A maximum of six Honors Contracts (six credits) may be taken at the College (includes 179H and 279H).

Lecture: 1 hours

Prerequisite(s): Must be taken concurrently with a 2000-level course in Humanities, whose instructor agrees to mentor the student in the sophomore honors contract. Departmental approval required.

HUM-281H Special Topics: Phi Theta Kappa Honors In Action Seminar 3 Credits

The Phi Theta Kappa Honors in Action research project is designed to engage students in informed action-based research meant to foster student success and growth as scholars and leaders. The course will emphasize analytic and collaborative problem solving and leadership skills. Students will take lessons gleaned from the analysis of their research to create an action-oriented project element to provide tangible support to their communities.

Other Required Hours: Seminar: 3 hours per week. Prerequisite(s): Departmental Approval

HUM-282H Honors Advanced Independent Study/Research: Humanities 1-3 Credits

Advanced Honors-level directed individual study. Must meet criteria set forth in the Honors Course Checklist used to approve regular honors courses. Study/research title and specific content arranged between instructor and student. May be repeated for a maximum of six credits of different topics.

Lecture: 1-3 hours

Prerequisite(s): Departmental approval and instructor approval, and ENG-0995 Applied College Literacies, or appropriate score on English Placement Test; and must have earned an A or B in at least 3 honors courses. Note: ENG-0990 Language Fundamentals II taken prior to Fall 2021 will also meet prerequisite requirements.
